# THE MONTH.

The College re-opened on the 18th November and the staff and the students returned to their work after having enjoyed the pleasures of the Poojah season. They have now a short term before them between this and the Christmas holidays—but a term of unusual strain, considering that the work of the classes preparing themselves for the ensuing examinations will have to be hurried through during this brief season.

The event of the month is the publication of the list of nominated Fellows (under the new Universities Act), which appeared in the Gazette of India on the 19th November. The number has

been considerably reduced, thus enabling the body to discharge the responsible duty of legislating on University matters with efficiency and vigour. The actual figure stands at 64 (leaving the ten elected Fellows out). One or two nominations may be found fault with, and a few omissions are certainly to be regretted, but we must unhesitatingly say, that all things considered, the selections have been eminently judicicus. The teachers have found, we are glad to be able to say, an adequate representation on the new Senate. This is a decided improvement on the old state of things.

The newly constituted Faculties met of the 26th November to elect Fellows from among the members of the old Senate. Principal Edwards (now on furlough), Professor Gourisankar De and Principal Bipin Vihari Gupta have been elected by the Faculty of Arts, and Professors Little and Chunilal Bose have been elected by the Faculty of Science. We are glad to notice that the elected Fellows are all teachers. This is as it should be.

A conference of the Heads of Calcutta Colleges under the chairmanship of Mr. Pedler was held early this month, in which the question was discussed at some length and ultimately referred to ाव sub-committee consisting of Babu Surendra Nath Banerji, Mr. N. N. Ghosh, Babu Umes Chundra Dutt, Rev. A. B. Wann, Mr. G. C. Bose, Rev. E. M. Wheeler, Mr. R. Tipping, and Mr. C. F. Russell, (Secretary), with instructions to devise a practicable scheme for regulating the choice of students in the selection of "messes." 'Promises of materialfinancial help from the Government have been held out. The result of this new move is anxiously awaited by all who take any interest in the education of our young men.
