Prof. Mrityunjay Chatterjee.

With extreme regret we record the death of Babu Mrityunjay Chatterjee, M. A, B. L. a rising advocate of the High Court of Calcutta, who was for a long time connected with our college as a Professor of Logic and Philosophy. He died in November last at the age of 41. May his soul rest in peace! We offer our heart felt condolence to his bereaved family. Jur College was closed for a day out of respect tor his memory.

THE RESULTS

The results of the I.Sc. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 19th June. 654 have passed in the First Division (as against 854 of last year), 763 in the Second Division (as against 834 of last year), and 137 in the Third Division (as against 158 of last year). The total number of passes at the I. Sc. this year thus comes up to 1554, which is lower than the last year's figure by 292. This shows a steady decline in the number of passes at the I. Sc. Examination.

At the I. Sc. Examination our College has passed 268. This is the largest, number passed by any College, just as it has been the case in the last fourteen years. Of this total, 100 have passed in the First Division, 135 in the Second Division and 33 in the Third Division. Of the first ten places as many as four have been occupied by our boys We congratulate Sreemans Achyutananda Ghosh, Jnanendra Bhusan Chaudhuri, Manmothanath Barman Ray, and Aryakumar Sen on their having secured the 2nd, 4th, 6th and 9th places respectively, in order of merit. Other successful candidates from our College who deserve special mention are—Parbaticharan Ghosh (11th), Samarendranath Sen (11th), Sudhansusekhar Ghosh (13th), Amarchand Chakravarti (17th), Parbaticharan Kundu (19th), Bhabadev Bhattacharyya 22nd), Ranendrakumar Saha (22nd), and Prabhatkumar Sarkar (24th). In fact, of the first 25 places as many as 12 have been secured by our boys. The results of our College this year are thus unique.

We are proud to record that our boys have kept up the tradition of the College. As many as seven of our students have secured Senior Government Scholarships this year. Of these Sreemans Achyutananda Ghosh, Manmothanath Barman Ray and Jnanendra Bhusan Chaudhuri have secured First grade Senior Scholarships of Rs 25 a month each, while the remaining four viz. Sreemans Bhavadev Bhattacharyya, Prabhat Kumar Sarkar, Aryakumar Sen and Parbaticharan Ghosh have been the recipients of second grade Senior Scholarships of Rs 20 a month. We congratulate these students as well as ourselves on their having done so well at the Examination, and hope their examples will be emulated by their successors.

The results of the I. A. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette along with the I. Sc. results, 492 have passed in the First Division, 967 in the Second Division, and 382 in the Third Division. The total thus comes up to 1841 which is higher than the last year's output by 185. There is thus a slight increase of the passes at the I. A. Examination.

At the I. A. Examination our College has passed 14. Of these 4 have passed in the First Division, 9 have been placed in the Second Division, and 1 only in the Third Division. The total number of our passes at the I. A. Examination looks very poor indeed when contrasted with the total number of our

passes at the I. Sc., but this is due to the fact that we have very few students on the Arts side.

The results of the B. Sc. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 10th July. 70 have obtained Honours (as against 114 of the previous year), 97 have passed with Distinction (as against 134 of last year), and 270 have passed in the Pass Course (as against 404 of last year). This brings the total up to 437 which is lower than the last year's total by 115.

At the B. Sc. Examination our College has passed 28. Of these 1 has obtained Honours in Physiology, 8 have passed with Distinction, and the rest in the Pass Course.

The results of the B. A. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 31st July. 292 have obtained Honours (as against 301 of the previous year), 151 have passed with Distinction, and 1104 have passed in the Pass Course (as against 1420 of the previous year). This brings the total up to 1547 which is much lower than the last year's total of 1825. Thus there is a marked decline of the passes at both the B. A. and B. Sc. Examinations this year.

At the B. A. Examination our College has passed 30. Of these 4 have obtained Honours in English, 3 have passed with Distinction, and the remaining 23 in the Pass Course.

The second, half of the last year was a period of great tension to the Head Master and his colleagues, to save the youngsters from the peculiar contagion of the time. The Sports of the School could not be given satisfactory scope to, and the Boy Scout movement had to be kept entirely in abeyance. An improvement however has been introduced in the system of Medical Inspection of the boys, for, besides detecting and reporting to guardians any disorders found in the system of their wards, it has been arranged that free medical advice as to the best way of treating those disorders will be given to guardians whenever they ask for it.

The School sent up 47 candidates for the last Matriculation Examination. Of these 37 came out successful, 17 being placed in the First Division, 17 in the Second Division, and 3 in the Third Division. The percentage of success was 78.72 against 86.79 in 1929.
