THE MONTH.

The College closed for the Easter holidays and the Long Vacation on Thursday the 17th April and re-opened on Wednesday the 2nd July. After the re-opening of the College, it closed on Thursday the 3rd July, out of respect for the memory of the late Principal Ramendra Sundar Trivedi, whose untimely death has deprived Bengal of a true man, a ripe scholar and a devoted educationist.

The new classes (First Year Class—5 sections) have commenced work but there will be some delay in forming the Third Year Class as well as the special sections for the plucked Intermediate and B. A. Students.

THE COLLEGE UNION held its second sitting on Monday the 14th April, from 7 to 9 P. M. Considering that it was the Bengalee New Year's Day and the night of the full-moon, the Union might be considered as having had its Natur Khata as well as its Pur rima milan on the occasion. There was the usual varied entertonment

of music, the reading of papers and a sumptuous repast. Professor Pulinbehari Kar graced the occasion with a poem on the inauguration of the Union (which is printed in the body of the Magazine); Professor Panchanan Mitra gave his colleagues a sample of his. researches on the Antiquity of man in India—which was a curious conglomerate of Geology, Archæology and Anthropology! Professor Panchanan Ghoshal read a humorous paper on Kalidashe. nesha and Professor Davendranath Mukherjee read another humorous paper entitled Okalatir Moha; this last was supplemented by Professor Lalitkumar Banerjee with the reading of an excerpt on the same topic from Bangali-charit, a well-known humorous production of the late Jogendranath Bose of Bangabasi fame. On the whole, the affair was a great success and at the closing stage of the sitting, the Principal treated his colleagues to a neat little speech in which he expressed great satisfaction over the esprit de corps that was so much in evidence in the College Union.

THE RESULTS.

The results of the I. Sc. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 18th June. 727 have passed in the First Division, 415 in the Second Division and 37 in the Third Division, bringing up the total to 1179. The total is higher than last year's by more than 200—a proof of the growing zeal for Science evinced by the young men of Bengal.
